OUR LEGACY

William J. Pulte (1932-2018) was a Master Builder, quiet philanthropist, and a loving family man.

Born during the Great Depression, Bill's journey was from a hardworking, vision-driven boy to an industry leader.

Bill constructed his first home in 1951 at age 18. Bill later founded Pulte Homes and led its growth to become the largest home-building Fortune 500 company in America.

Bill was a faith-filled man and believed wholeheartedly in Luke 12:49 that "to whom much is given, much will be required." He was a quiet giver who shared his resources and faith to support organizations and communities that reflected his vision of a more caring and compassionate world.

OUR FOUR AREAS OF GIVING

PROVIDING SUSTENANCE FOR TODAY AND OPPORTUNITIES FOR TOMORROW IN THE UNITED STATES AND GLOBALLY

According to Catholic tradition, the Seven Corporal Works of Mercy addresses the physical needs of the poor. These include feeding the hungry; giving drink to the thirsty; clothing the naked; caring for captives; sheltering the homeless; visiting the sick; and assisting the mourning.

In accordance with the Seven Corporal Works of Mercy, we support nonprofit organizations that fall into four areas of giving: care for others, education, hunger and thirst, and shelter.

CARE FOR OTHERS

We support nonprofit initiatives in the areas of mental, behavioral, and physical healthcare, persons with disabilities, disadvantaged youth, crisis assistance, religious organizations, veterans, victims of violence or human trafficking, senior citizens, and solutions to humanitarian issues.

EDUCATION

We support educational initiatives through public and private schools, colleges, universities, trade schools, scholarships, academic leadership, policy, practice, and academic research addressing global affairs and effective, scalable, innovative programs and solutions for poverty.

HUNGER & THIRST

We support nonprofit initiatives which provide clean water, sustainable water infrastructure, nutritional and food access programs, school meal programs, agricultural research, and development for sustainable hunger solutions.

SHELTER

We support nonprofit initiatives that assist those experiencing homelessness or poverty, teenage single mothers, foster youth, individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities, veterans, victims of violence or human trafficking, and natural disasters.

In addition to the hotels being a living embodiment of the Foundation's values, one hundred percent of the net profits from each hotel support our humanitarian initiatives in the United States and globally.

SAINT JOHN'S RESORT

Initially established by the Archdiocese of Detroit as a Provincial Seminary in 1948, Saint John's Resort is the epitome of modern luxury on historical grounds, sitting upon 200 beautiful acres just outside of Detroit.

Saint John's continued its major transformations in 2022, including renovating the former seminary and golf course to create the first destination resort property in Southeast Michigan.



OUR HOUSING INITIATIVES




Our founder, William J. Pulte (1932-2018), was not only a builder of homes, he was also a builder of communities. We partner with nonprofit organizations to provide access to safe and affordable housing.

Our role is to provide the strategic vision and, together with community partners, advance the investments needed to build and support affordable housing communities.

We are embarking on two new housing initiatives with community foundations in Florida.

Through these partnerships, we are advancing affordable housing for low-income families in Immokalee and independent living options for adults with mild to moderate intellectual and developmental disabilities in South Florida.

Proposed development plan

Immokalee is an agricultural community with a large migrant farming population located in Southwest Florida. Over 40 percent of the population lives below the poverty level in Immokalee.

There is a shortage of safe, affordable housing in Immokalee, creating strain on the community's families, students, workforce, and economy.

Together with the Nuestra Señora De La Vivienda Community Foundation, we are taking a community-first approach to focus on safe, affordable housing, early childhood education, and supportive programs to help families live successful and healthy lives in Immokalee.

We seek to develop affordable single-family homes for rent to improve local housing access and stability while strengthening our nonprofit partnerships for early education and other family-centered initiatives in the community.

The IDDeal HomeSouth Florida

One of the most basic needs for adults with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD) is housing designed for independent living.

In Florida, over 430,000 people are diagnosed with I/DD, yet Florida ranks 49th in the nation for providing services for I/DD populations.

In partnership with the Intellectually Developmentally Disabled Community Foundation, and the IDDeal Foundation, we are building a small independent residential community, "the IDDeal Home," for individuals with mild to moderate I/DD in South Florida.

The IDDeal Home will provide an affordable, inclusive, safe, and supportive community where adults with I/DD are able to cultivate the skills, relationships, and safety they need to live with purpose for independent and fulfilling lives.

OUR SCHOLARSHIPS

EXPANDING EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES FOR STUDENTS IN PUBLIC AND PRIVATE SCHOOLS, TRADE SCHOOLS, AND UNIVERSITIES

Academy of the Sacred Heart

Academy of the Sacred Heart, located in Bloomfield Hills, Michigan, is part of a community of more than 150 schools committed to forming global citizens. With 200 years of experience, Sacred Heart educators build on best practices to design intentional, individual experiences to challenge each student. The Foundation provides full scholarships to students who would otherwise be unable to attend due to financial need.

Ferris State University

William J. Pulte recognized during his lifetime the importance of a skilled and responsive workforce to assure quality and value in home construction today. The Foundation established the William J. Pulte Construction Practices Lab and the William J. Pulte Construction Scholarship to help ensure Ferris State University in Michigan can continue developing leaders in the construction industry.

Industrial Arts Institute

The Industrial Arts Institute (IAI) specializes in building the professional trades workforce. IAI's comprehensive Industrial Welding Program is Michigan's fastest and highest-level welder certificate program. IAI's hands-on, project-based approach provides expert faculty support with deep industry experience and equips students to become workforce-ready employees.

Mackinac Island Public School

Each year in Northern Michigan's Mackinac Island Public School, two graduating seniors receive scholarship awards from the William J. Pulte Scholarship Program, which provides tuition and a stipend for academic testing, college application fees, and travel. In addition, the Foundation supports Mackinac Island Public School each year with a direct fund to be used for the college preparation of juniors and seniors.

Northern Michigan University

Located in Marquette, Michigan is a dynamic four-year, public, comprehensive university. Pulte Scholars receive scholarships through the William J. Pulte Scholarship Fund and the William J. Pulte Community Service Endowment Fund.

Southeast Michigan Construction Academy

Southeast Michigan Construction Academy is a school created by the construction industry for the construction industry. Trade Masters teach classes at four locations throughout Southeast Michigan. The school offers certification in the trades of carpentry, electrical, HVAC, sheet metal, and roofing. The Foundation provides up to twenty-six full-ride scholarships per year.

University of Notre Dame William J. Pulte Endowed Scholarship Fund

The William J. Pulte Endowed Scholarship Fund is awarded to need-based students in the School of Architecture, College of Engineering, Keough School of Global Affairs, and the Kroc Institute for International Peace Studies.



Friends of Disabled Adults and Children provides refurbished medical equipment

PULTE FAMILY FOUNDATION GRANT SUPPORTS:

General and Program Operations

FODAC (Friends of Disabled Adults and Children) recycles home medical equipment (HME) and assistive technology and is dedicated to those with mobility needs.

Ed and Annie Butchart first saw the need for HME equipment and repairs while serving the community through their church. In 1985, they started collecting and repairing equipment in their garage and founded FODAC the following year.

Since its inception, FODAC has helped people ranging in age from 18 months to 105 years of age. FODAC is housed in a 64,800-square-foot building in Tucker, Georgia with a staff of 35. They provide \$10 million dollars annually in equipment and services to individuals with disabilities, which enhances their quality of life so they can attend school, keep jobs, and live independently.

Over the years, FODAC's model to assist individuals with disabilities has remained the same: to provide free or low-cost wheelchairs, home medical equipment, vehicle and home adaptations, and more.

SAFARI DOCTORS

Safari Doctors provides innovative, community-driven healthcare solutions for marginalized communities in Kenya

PULTE FAMILY FOUNDATION GRANT SUPPORTS:

Programs to improve child and maternal health

Safari Doctors is a women-led nonprofit and the recipient of the 2017 United Nations Person of the Year award "for the outstanding efforts and commendable work providing medical care to marginalized communities in the far-reaching areas of Lamu."

The indigenous communities they serve live within the archipelago and on the mainland near the border with Somalia, where insecurity, neglect, and remoteness prevent them from accessing vital health services.

Safari Doctor teams conduct monthly mobile clinics by boat and road reaching up to 20 remote villages. Together with outpatient services offered at the Safari Doctors Medical Centre, they reach up to 2,000 patients every month.

In addition to addressing immediate medical needs, they are also preparing for the future. Their Youth Health Ambassadors program trains young men and women to become Community Health Workers and agents of positive change in their communities.

Horizons for Youth was founded in 1991 with the belief that quality education from an early age, a strong adult support system, and connection to their community were key elements to a child's academic success.

Today, Horizons for Youth continues to remove barriers to quality education for more than 200 students from Chicago's west and south sides, through comprehensive academic programs and support services.

Horizons for Youth works directly with families, community organizations, and schools to coordinate services for students, including mentoring, tutoring, the development of Individualized Education Plans, and other resources.

Outcomes of their programs include an unprecedented 99% graduation rate, 99% post-secondary enrollment rate, and 84% college graduation rate among Horizon for Youth program graduates.

Providing education for girls and boys for Malawi's future

Academic, mental health, and special needs resources for students

In a country of 18 million people, 50% of people in Malawi are under the age of 16. Therefore, the future of the nation rests on quality educational opportunities for its youth.

Loyola Jesuit Secondary School (LJSS) is a coeducational national secondary school located in Kasungu. Valuing the importance of inclusive and equitable education, LJSS serves 600 boys and girls and ensures academic opportunities for marginalized students. Its first graduating class was in 2019, and these students embodied the LISS motto: "come to LJSS not just to make a living but learn to make a difference."

Investing in lifelong learning opportunities by providing for mental health, Ignatian formation, special needs resources for students, and supporting the arts as part of a holistic education program, has directly benefited the students at LJSS. Additionally, the construction and maintenance of the school facilities provide significant employment opportunities for people from the Kasungu area.

General and Program Operations

Our Father's House Soup Kitchen, located in Pompano Beach, FL, is dedicated to helping the homeless and those in need.

Since its inception in 1989, Our Father's House has served over 900,000 meals and grown to a full-service Ministry under the direction of Katie Crissy as CEO.

A hot four-course meal and meal bag to go are served to nearly 200 individuals daily. Our Father's house annually provides more than 104,000 in a peaceful and sheltered environment.

Nearly 300 shoes are provided monthly, along with emergency food, personal hygiene items, and clothing assistance. Recycled bike transportation and a barber shop help prepare individuals for employment.

Our Father's House's goal is to provide nutrition and assistance, and they hope to give guests a hand-up rather than a handout.

SEMILLA NUEVA

Fighting malnutrition, hunger, and poverty with corn

PULTE FAMILY FOUNDATION GRANT SUPPORTS:

Fortified corn seed donations to low-income farmers in Guatemala to fight malnutrition

Semilla Nueva was founded in 2018 with the belief that nutrition is the foundation for each child's future.

Malnutrition limits a child's cognitive and physical growth, increasing the possibility of children not finishing school and being 30% more likely to live in poverty as adults. Millions of people worldwide rely on staple foods that do not provide enough micronutrients for overall health.

To alleviate this complex problem, Semilla Nueva develops, produces, and promotes corn seeds that have been conventionally bred (non-GMO) to have higher levels of critical missing nutrients.

Seeds are sold directly to farmers while working with the Guatemalan government and national seed companies to scale their use to improve the nutrition of millions of Guatemala's poorest people.



Starting Right, Now ends homelessness for youth by providing one-on-one mentoring, a stable home, assisting with employment opportunities, teaching financial literacy/life skills, and promoting educational achievement. Their vision is to have society gain adults who are motivated, vested in their futures, and meaningful contributors to the community.

Each student in the program has endured many obstacles in their life. There are over 6,000 homeless students accounted for in the Tampa Bay area, and while they don't have material possessions, what they possess is strength, resilience, and determination.

Through their programs, Starting Right, Now's goal is to end the generational cycle of poverty by providing these students the tools and resources they need to become leaders and end youth homelessness, one child at a time.

Operations and innovative mortgage pilot program to help low-income families in Mexico

New Story pioneers solutions to end global homelessness. By 2030, the UN predicts 3 billion people will be living without safe shelter.

Committed to the use of new technologies such as 3-D printed homes and block-chain mortgages, they are building safer homes that require less time and money.

New Story is currently creating a mortgage model that builds a financially sustainable path to homeownership for families who struggle to access the traditional banking system.

With local partners, local resources, and local labor, these programs helped to house nearly 15,000 individuals to date in Mexico, Haiti, El Salvador, and Bolivia.

Pulte Family Partnership

In November 2019, the University of Notre Dame received a \$111 million partnership gift from the Pulte Family Charitable Foundation. A portion of this gift was directed towards the endowment and directorship of the Pulte Institute for Global Development. Founded in honor of William J. Pulte, the Pulte Family Charitable Foundation works to meet the basic human needs of the most marginalized members of the human family.

In 2021, the Foundation made grants and donations to 170 organizations that fall into four areas of giving: hunger and thirst, shelter, educational access, and care for others. Additionally, the Foundation extended this mission to include businesses that contribute to economic development in local communities through the purchase of two historic hotels in Michigan. One hundred percent of the profits from each hotel will be used to fund the Foundation's grant program.

Despite never enrolling in college himself, Bill Pulte recognized the power of education. To honor Bill's legacy, the Foundation established scholarship funds for students who exemplify many of the traits that Bill admired: integrity, ambition, grit, and commitment to hard work. There were 30 "Pulte Scholars" in 2021, including 10 from the University of Notre Dame. Among them is Tom Henry, a senior studying computer science who has been working with Tim Weninger, the Frank M. Freimann Associate Professor of Engineering and a Pulte Institute Faculty Fellow, on the Misinformation Early Warning System (MEWS): an AI system designed to identify and track manipulated images, deepfake videos and disinformation online.

"This scholarship has helped me access fantastic resources and achieve so much at Notre Dame. I was able to study abroad in Silicon Valley, get a provisional patent on my work, and lead projects through Notre Dame's Student International Business

Council. My time in Professor Weninger's lab has allowed me to not only sharpen my coding skills, but also gain valuable work experience with organizations like USAID. I am so grateful for this incredible scholarship!"

Sustainability

The Earth's environment and scarce resources must be stewarded with ever-increasing care as the health of the environment is integrally linked to a flourishing global society. At the Pulte Institute, we collaborate with faculty conducting research on climate, energy, water, and sustainable cities and examine how these issues affect global poverty and inequality.

Humanitarianism

Billions of dollars are spent annually to address the 65+ million refugees and migrants displaced by conflict, natural disaster, or severe lack of economic opportunity. At the Pulte Institute, we work to integrate sustainable development practices into humanitarianism work and policy in order for crisis interventions to be successful and sustainable.

Effective States and Development

Good governance and effective states are integral to the realization of the SDGs. At the Pulte Institute, we focus on aid effectiveness and policy in the poorest of nations by researching existing programs, evaluating donor agency innovations, and designing new approaches and policies to deliver more effective aid; all in order to ensure states and their policies work for the people.

Business in Development

The private sector is increasingly outspending the public sector in global development investment, but is also faced with challenging ethical dilemmas in nations with weak institutions and corruption. At the Pulte Institute, we provide a home for discussions on ethical and sustainable supply chain performance, social entrepreneurship, and public-private partnerships, among other topics.

Global Health

In a globalized world, disease moves quickly across borders and many global and national public health systems are weak and inadequate. At the Pulte Institute, we seek to take the knowledge developed by Notre Dame researchers to field practitioners, who are on the front lines in developing countries and can put these findings to work.

MANDELA WASHINGTON FELLOWSHIP FOR YOUNG AFRICAN LEADERS

In 2022, The Pulte Institute for Global Development welcomed 25 emerging professionals from 17 African countries.


Established in 2014, the Mandela Washington Fellowship has brought nearly 5,800 accomplished leaders and innovators between the ages of 25 and 35 from every country in Sub-Saharan Africa to the United States for academic and leadership training.

To date, the Pulte Institute has hosted 175 Fellows from 38 countries for a six-week Leadership Institute, sponsored by the U.S. Department of State.

During the Fellowship, the Fellows participate in sixweek Leadership Institutes, studying business, civic engagement, or public management hosted by U.S. colleges or universities. Throughout the Institutes, Fellows enrich local U.S. communities while sharing best practices.

After the Institutes, Fellows convene for a Summit, where they forge connections with one another and U.S. leaders from the private, public, and non-profit sectors, setting the stage for long-term engagement between the United States and Africa.




